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My Short and Beautiful Time at Mosaic

y family arrived in Canada (Winnipeg) in January 2014. It took more than a month to get a place as an EAL student at Mosaic after I took WELARC's English benchmark test because of unavailable childcare for my 2 year old son. However, as I later on discover, it was worth the wait.

I got a phone call from Stephanie that there is a space for me as well as for my son. After completing all formalities and registration, we talked things about my previous work experiences as kindergarten teacher and Stephanie suggested it will be a good idea to volunteer in the future to the childcare facility at Mosaic. I was really impressed and excited about the idea. Shortly, I started taking English classes in April 2014 and all the teachers were very nice to me. Their comments and encouragement helped me very much to improve my English language skills in short period of time.

I started volunteering as child care assistant at Mosaic in May 2014 for 2 days a week and got a very good feedback from the Mosaic staff. They were telling me that I am doing a very good job with the childcare program and that meant a lot to me. I also took most of the other programs offered at Mosaic such as Positive Discipline, Playback Theatre, Wiggle Giggle and Munch, Parent-child Mother Goose and many more. These programs have broadened my skills not only in my parent-child relationship but in facilitating programs as well.

Soon, I got a wonderful email from Kym that says she has heard a lot of good qualities about me from Mosaic staffs and offered a two week job to replace a worker and I was very happy.

I am leaving Mosaic with one eye crying and another laughing. I will never forget the treatments and hospitality of the Mosaic staff. As I said earlier, the long wait finally resulted as a dream come true. Thank you very much for making the beginning of my Canadian life easy and memorable. I know Mosaic will always remain a gateway to success for newcomers.

Mosaic to Double (Almost) in Size!

his summer Mosaic was successful in negotiating an expansion with our main funder, Citizenship and Immigration Canada. The space next to our main location on Carlton Street is about 3,200 square feet, almost as big as our current space!

The renovations will be completed in January and will include an expanded childcare room and add a much needed baby room. This will allow us to take 6 more children ages 19 months – 5 years, and 4 children ages 6 months to 19 months. There is a very high need for more childcare spaces for parents studying English downtown, so we are very happy to be able to improve wait times for ESL students in this community. We will be able to take some students off of our ESL waitlist and get them into our ESL classes, and their children into our fantastic childcare program.

The new space will also improve our family programs by providing a large family room, with a window! We will have some additional office space, a staff lounge and more storage.

We are also very fortunate to have Avenue Living as the building owners. Avenue Living has been very supportive of Mosaic, and held the space for us until we were able to confirm with CIC, even though they had another offer at the same time.

Stay tuned for program updates, and a chance to celebrate with us in 2015!

Positive Discipline Training in Dadaab Refugee Camp, Kenya



have just returned form my fourth trip to East Africa to train facilitators in Positive Discipline in Everyday Parenting. This trip was back to Kenya to reconnect with the group from Dadaab Refugee Camp. It was made possible through the support of Save the Children Sweden, Save the Children Kenya, and a grant from Grand Challenges Canada. The training was in the city of Garissa, located about 90 kilometers from the camp. With a population of approximately 500,000 people, Dadaab is the largest refugee camp in the world and has been in existence for over 20 years.

When I return from these trips to Kenya, Ethiopia and Tanzania I am asked by many to describe my experiences. I can show photos and talk about the training but can never find words to share how my heart is touched by the people I meet. One of the participants in the Garissa training offered to share his story. I think perhaps Ojulu's words will touch everyone.

I was born in Elia village in Gambella Region, located in south western part of Ethiopia. In 1990, I joined my primary class in Itang district and completed my secondary education in the year 2001. I joined Nursing collage the same year and graduated from Gambella Nursing College on November 2002 and I have been awarded with nursing certificate.

On January 2003, I was employed in the government hospital and I worked there till December 2003 because of the mass killing on our tribe by the Government of Ethiopia. In 2003, me and my wife and brother fled the country crossing southern Sudan to Kenya, where I am currently living. Life was so difficult in the refugee camp and we have started building houses where we can live and we managed to do it.

In 2007, we got our baby boy; me and my wife became very happy for our new born baby. However, taking care of the baby was not easy for us since it was our first time to have the baby. So we just tried our best.

Food was a challenge for us because the ration we use to receive from World Food Program/WFP was not enough for feeding. It is only three kilogram of maize, white flour and beans given for fifteen days. Due to lack of food, the child used to cry everyday and he does not understand what is going on and when he cries we use to react. It also became so difficult for us when my older brother died in 2012 in the camp due to the sickness.

Since I joined positive Discipline in everyday Parenting program, my family life has changed, Me and my wife understood how to respond to the child positively with a happy face. Our child is now happy and used to us talking positively.

I am so pleased with this program and I will continue to share with the others so that they can achieve their children's Long-term goals.

My dream is to be a doctor in the future and to help my people who are still suffering from different diseases. I also want my wife to be a Doctor too and my son to be a pilot.
