itnessing the continuous growth of Mosaic

never ceases to amaze me. During the past months, we have embarked on a fresh and exciting project: our new Family Room! We have worked together to build up a welcoming and engaging space so newcomer families and everyone else that is part of our community could benefit from it, and although it had its challenges in the beginning, the room and the idea gradually took the appropriate shape. Today, we can see a community that is growing and getting more involved with different activities and family programs, and more importantly, that has found a safe and inviting place to start from: our own family room!

Mosaic has responded to the needs of the community one more time, and now we have a new place to enjoy, have fun, relax and socialize. Our family room is open on a daily basis, and the families can use it as they need it. We currently have a drop in program, where we provide age appropriate activities for children giving them the opportunity to learn through playing, while the

adults are invited to participate and support this learning as well. We practice rhymes and songs, play games, and encourage creativity. We have a multilingual library with books in English and different languages, and a comfortable space for adults to relax and socialize. In this program we also promote good nutrition, so everyone has the chance to enjoy a healthy and delicious snack while learning about its benefits.

This multifunctional room also serves as a family programs site, so the participants have the possibility of joining different programs. Storytelling, Positive Discipline in Everyday Parenting, Nobody's Perfect, and Parent Child Mother Goose are some of the programs that have been hosted here, and many more are coming.

This is just the beginning... we will continue working towards a place that responds more sensitively and effectively to the needs of our growing community.

Hi! I'm Reem! I'm a Settlement Worker at Mosaic. My job is to help and support newcomers to Canada. I am a newcomer myself; I came to Canada in 2007. Some of the things I do are: offering information, providing support and helping newcomers find programs and services available in the community.

I also facilitate a program called "Positive Discipline in Every Day Parenting" the best moment for me is when a parent tells me how the program made a good change in his family's life. I support the students in their day to day challenges like translating documents, planning appointments, and their housing issues. I make sure newcomers and refugees understand their rights and responsibilities whilst living here in Canada by doing interesting presentations such as "Parenting in a New Country" and "Safety in Canada". If they need Referrals, I make sure to refer them to the suitable place that can serve them in the best way!

Starting in 2016 with the great influx of Syrian refugees, there was a huge demand for settlement services. Mosaic has always been in the front line supporting newcomers through English classes, Family Programs, and Settlement Support. My favourite part of my job is when I visit the childcare and help the little ones to express their feelings and emotions and assist their parents to communicate clearly with our wonderful team of childcare workers! Mosaic is a great place that empowers people and helps them settle down in the most positive and friendly way.




hawn was born in Nanaimo, BC and raised in


