



What stands out in year nine must be the renovation at Knox United Church and the continued expansion of LINC classes bringing our total to 24 (26 in September) from the original 9, in 2009. 2 thriving home visit programs delivering critical parenting and literacy information in homes in first language, and time for professional development for all staff including two out of province conferences, and multiple workshops and opportunities to learn and grow. Along side all of that, our internal structure changed and strengthened to accommodate the growth.

What's in store for this time next year? That is the question the Board and staff have started to ask as we approach the end of our current multiyear agreement with the government of Canada. Mosaic is going through a strategic visioning process to get us fired up and ready to take on whatever comes next. We won't be surprised to see the bars on our growth chart rise again, we haven't known anything else.

Many thanks to the outstanding people that we work with on a daily basis and who continue to inspire us. Thank you also to our wonderful board of directors, funders, partners, supporters and friends - we deeply appreciate all of the support.

FINANCIAL OVERVIEW

Mosaic had another successful fiscal year in 2017-2018. Our overall funding increased by 31% to over \$2.7 million from the previous year; and our funding sources were relatively stable. Mosaic receives 91% of its funding from the federal government department – Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada (IRCC); however, we also seek alternate funding that allows us to deliver a wide range of programs that are not restricted by any client eligibility criteria. This diverse funding also offers some protection to the organization, and ensures our stability.

With our year on year growth, we determined the need to strengthen our financial team and internal control systems. We have developed several new systems this year to meet the increasing budget and program growth, and the related requirements from the government. The improved in-house financial information system allows us to process our very complex payroll, claims and benefits in an efficient and manageable way.

One improvement from our federal funder was a switch to a more streamlined reporting system that no longer requires us to report separately on funding streams. That has improved our efficiency.

Overall, it was a great year for Mosaic, our financial future looks sustainable as we look forward to a new multi-year funding agreement with IRCC in 2020.












Highlights

It's the little things that make a difference

We have had an incredible year, running over 70 programs in partnerships across the city. The demand for Mosaic Family Programs, our mentorship, training, workshops and presentations has grown exponentially and we are humbled by the gift of being able to be a part of this sacred work. However the highlights of our days are not necessarily the big successes that you can measure in numbers but more the daily joys we have the honour of witnessing like; parents feeling safe in their vulnerability as they share parenting struggles, the amazing growth in both self-confidence and skills as new mentee facilitators find the courage to speak in front of a group, the pride in the eyes of the Family Engagement Mentees when, after devoting 80 hours, they receive their practicum certificate, isolated moms finding friendship and a sense of community in our Family Resource Centre, the stories of PDEP Peer Mentors as they talk of how honoured they feel walking beside parents on the PDEP 1-1 journey, the remarkable relationships that have grown between the HIPPY Home Visitors and the families they visit weekly and most of all enjoying the gentle smiles and spontaneous laughter as parents and, children experience the joy of playing together.

We have the privilege of being a part of these communities of families coming together to celebrate each other's accomplishments and to support each other in difficult times. When people walk into a Mosaic Family Program they talk about feeling welcome, feeling safe, feeling like they have found their second home. We are so grateful to be part of their new home.





Highlights

Moving – Learning – Growing

The LINC program had a routine of moving classrooms. At the beginning of this school year two classes and a childcare room moved from Immanuel Fellowship Church to a new, nearby location at Southlands Community Church. Students really liked the new classrooms; but unfortunately, we had to leave half way through the year. We packed up those two classrooms and the childcare room and moved in with our Fort Garry program while Southlands Church underwent roof repairs. "Fort Southlands" is currently our biggest site with a total of 10 classes and 3 childcare rooms. Many thanks to Fort Garry Mennonite Brethren Church for their generosity and flexibility!

Professional Development was another theme this school year; all of the LINC teachers attended a two-day conference in Edmonton – a great chance to meet LINC teachers from other provinces and a great variety of workshops were offered.

Another impactful PD was the two-day vicarious trauma workshop that gave important reminders for self-care and reflections about trauma. Soon after, we put learning in to practice and our new teacher Laura initiated a lunch hour yoga class at Carlton. Opening classes is becoming another routine for the LINC program. In February, we opened two more classes at Knox Church where we eventually completed a renovation in the basement that gave us two new classrooms and office space.

Finally, starting this September we will expand our program at Bethel Church; we are so grateful that we are able to offer afternoon classes there, which will bring the LINC program to 26 classes, and take some pressure off of our perpetual waiting list.

We continued a great partnership with the Red River College ECE Workplace Program this year. We learn from the students that do their placements with us, and we hope that they get a good sense of a multicultural community based CNC program.

Our staff members had many amazing PD opportunities including; cooking with children, attachment theory and pre-math skills.

All of the Mosaic ECE's were fortunate to be able to attend a national conference in Mississauga hosted by the national CNC governing body, CMAS. The conference was an opportunity to strengthen our capacity to support refugee children and their families by exploring: the impact, and effects of the refugee experience and trauma on young children and their families, and how we can help them build resilience.

We also enjoyed meeting and learning from other CNC programs across the country.

Our expansion at the Knox infant site means that we can now have a total of 20 babies at that site, now our largest baby room.

We are very proud to hire many of our LINC students and participants from the Family Engagement Mentorship (FEM) program. It's a wonderful feeling to help newcomers achieve their goals and obtain employment within our Mosaic family.

Our childcare sites are filled with daily success stories including children successfully making the sometimes difficult transition in to our care, and sharing their culture and language with us. The children make new friends, and learn and play together in our high quality programs.

The children's smiles and their joy is our biggest success story!

Learning about Equality

Over the year we speak occasionally about how I, as the teacher, I am not more important than my students: we are all important; we are all working together to make things happen. This conversation happens again when we speak of whose job it is to clean up (not necessarily the caretaker's) Last week; one student said to me after class one day, "Canada is good. We are the same - big money /little money, man /woman, English/ Arabic all people together. Not up and down. (He moved his hands high and low to show up and down), is good here."

He's the same student who brought all his many kids to the childcare himself and did all the parent things for them while his wife was on a very short 5-week maternity leave. "I will be a Canadian father!" he said proudly.

Fire Safety!

Our class had been doing a short unit on fire safety, calling 911 and making home escape plans. In the course of the study, the students read about some dos and don'ts when it comes to various scenarios, including cooking fires and especially those involving grease.

A few days after finishing the unit, one of the students, a mother of two under age 4, related how she had inadvertently created a grease fire in a cooking pot on the stove just the day before. Remembering what she had read and what the class had discussed, she knew to turn off the burner and to use a lid to smother the flames rather than to throw water onto the fire, which of course, would only make the grease explode and splatter. Using a lid had been new information for her, and she said she would have used water if not for having just learned the proper ways to smother grease fire flames!
